

World Book Day

Teachers record themselves in disguise reading the blurb of their favourite book. The children have to guess the book and author as well as which teacher chose it.

Most inventive reading spot

Children and teachers take photos of themselves reading in unusual places. These can be used to make a display in the school.




Blind book date

Wrap a selection of books in brown paper and write one thing about the book, such as a description of the setting or the main character or why it's a good read. Take them around the classes and the children vote for one for their class.



Story stones

Decorate pebbles to tell a story.

Shoe box setting

Create a setting or a character's bedroom in a shoebox using what they know about the character.



Make book themed food

Make a meal described in a book, such as The Hungry Caterpillar fruit skewers, a Giant Jam Sandwich or Mrs Twit's worm spaghetti.


Book scavenger hunt

Set the children a challenge to find a book: that rhymes, is about an animal, has a one-word title etc.



Create a map

Make a map of a place described in a book, such as Narnia, Hogwarts or Gruffalo wood.




Tell a story, or scene from a story, in the traditional Willow pattern design. See <u>Kapow</u> <u>Primary Lesson</u> for more information.
