Oral tradition

- ▶ Before writing, many ancient societies shared their histories and beliefs through oral tradition. This involved storytelling, recitation and the use of gestures and symbols.
- ▶ The movement from oral to written traditions happened when communities wanted more permanent and reliable ways to record and share knowledge. Writing helped preserve the details that might otherwise have been lost or changed.
- Early writing materials included the use of hieroglyphs, clay tablets, walls, papyrus, palm leaves, animal skins, codices and later, paper.



- ▶ For some religious people, praying in the ancient language of their scriptures helps them feel more connected with God, gods or enlighted beings and their community. These languages are often believed to be holy.
- ▶ Many Muslims pray in Classical Arabic, the language of the Qur'an. Similarly, Biblical Hebrew, the language of the Torah, is used in Jewish prayers.
- Prayers in the Sikh worldview are performed in Gurmukhi, the script introduced by Guru Angad Dev and used to write the Guru Granth Sahib.
